

In the U.S. and now expanding into the E.U., embalmers and funeral directors have a growing and profound impact on a family's decision to donate the organs of a relative. You also have the clear obligation to serve the funeral wants and needs of families with efficiency and care.

The procurement process however places your noble task at cross purposes with your greater responsibility to suitably prepare a body for public viewing.

Typically one organ donor saves the lives of eight people and one tissue donor improves the quality of life for up to fifty people.
